



hank you, Barrington United Methodist Church. We've only been with you a few weeks, but I and my family have been made to feel at home. While we still don't remember many names, we do recognize a great many of your smiling faces. You've invited us into conversations and offered us embrace. You've been thoughtful with your explanations, and patient as we learn about you and our shared ministry.

The moment we walked in on July 1, we sensed that we'd been received into the life of this congregation. I've spoken with others who are newer to BUMC and its multi-site partners, and they have mentioned receiving a similar welcome. Clearly, how our communities move to include those who choose to become a part of them is bearing fruit.

Interestingly, July 1 wasn't the first time I was welcomed here. I've also been a guest, attending a number of Northern Illinois Annual Conference events held in this space. Many of you have directed me to restrooms and served me meals. You made copies of handouts, distributed bulletins, and operated audio visual equipment. You smiled at me when we made eye contact. This community made a positive, gracious impression on me long before I ever knew I'd be serving as one of its pastors. And, believe it or not, I didn't even have to walk in the doors to experience that welcome.

In the past, I drove by the BUMC building twice a day on my way to and from my church in Naperville. On Sundays, the whole family did so with me. We would see its steeple emerge from the trees as we rolled up the hills on Illinois highways 62 and 59. It was a peaceful constant and a reminder we were (around) halfway there.

The weather got rough for one of those Sunday return trips; the late-afternoon sky was black. Rain was blowing sideways and visibility was almost zero. Tree limbs littered the road. A large one fell on 62 and made it impossible to get to Algonquin. So, we turned around and came to BUMC's parking lot. We pulled in under the portico to wait it out. Services had concluded hours before and nobody was around, yet I have never been more welcomed in a church than on that day. It was as if the memory of that steeple was a lighthouse, and the building an ark.

Out my new office window, I've seen a parade of people who feel the same about our parking lot. They stop here when they have car trouble and when they need to make important phone calls. Children in dual-custody relationships transfer from car to car (and home to home) out there. I've even seen one pull in to nap. Sometimes, they make their way to the door. Sometimes, it is with an urgent need for a restroom. Sometimes, they need a little more. They need fuel for their empty bodies and automobiles. Sometimes, they have bills to pay. Sometimes, they need protection from another who is intent on doing harm. They, too, see the steeple and know what it means.

Welcome, you see, is an act of faith that begins even before invitation. It's hospitality found at the edge of everything we do and touch; it's wherever the remainders of our lives are found. It's a steeple visible for miles and a wide open parking lot at a busy intersection. It's the echoes of love in conversations we never intended anyone else to hear. It's a gracious word in those social media posts we don't think anybody else will see. It's something at which we can succeed — or fail — well before we know we're doing it. We can welcome or reject before we learn anything about those who enter the orbits of our lives and community.

So, on a case-by-case basis, we are a community that's called to welcome sojourners: those who happen by on their way somewhere else. And we — the church — do this because God asks it of us. We are to welcome the strangers in our midst because we've all been strangers, too ... even we who are pastors.

Because we are a community who welcomes beyond our worship services, we are always in need of monetary donations to replenish the Pastor's Discretionary Fund and purchase gift cards to share with the sojourners passing by. Ending Hunger One Step at a Time

S unday, October 21 marks the 36th anniversary of the Barrington Area CROP Hunger Walk. In the past 35 years, over 12,700 walkers have raised almost \$1.5 million and churches, civic organizations and people of all ages are getting ready to fight hunger once again.

Barrington United Methodist Church has been a participating church for each of the past 35 years. Last year, Barrington UMC's team of 22 walkers raised \$7,505, ranking 65th in the nation. This year we have the honor of being the host church, and we hope to have a strong turnout of volunteers, walkers, and supporters. We hope to see all ages participate; this is a wonderful family event!

Hunger is one of the greatest injustices facing our world, but it doesn't have to be this way. Ending hunger is possible, and it is possible in our lifetime. You can help make it happen. Our local CROP Hunger Walk is a great place to start. For an hour or two and a few miles, friends and neighbors will be coming together to "...love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." (I John 3:18) CROP Hunger Walks are community fundraising events sponsored by Church World Service (CWS), an international relief, development, and refugee resettlement agency. Money raised by CROP Hunger Walks nationwide is used by CWS to provide food, medical care, disaster relief, and self-help development for needy people around the world. From seeds and tools, to wells and water systems, to technical training and micro-enterprise loans, the key is

people working together to identify their own development priorities and then providing the resources that empower people to meet their own needs.

Twenty-five percent of funds raised in the Barrington Area CROP Hunger Walk are distributed to local hunger-alleviating agencies in the Barrington area. In 2017, the agencies included Northern Illinois Food Bank, FISH Food Pantry– Carpentersville, BACOA Meals with Wheels, Wauconda Island Lake Food Pantry, St. Anne Project Hope, and the People in Need program of the Barrington Area Ministerial Association.

St. Paul United Church of Christ, 401 E. Main St., Barrington, will be the step-off location for the Walk. Registration is at 12:30, the Walk begins at 1:00. There are many ways for you to be involved:

- You can walk on our team
- You can sponsor one (or several) of our walkers
- You can be a supporter
- You can help with hosting duties on the day of the Walk

We can all pray for hungry people and those involved with fighting hunger throughout the world.

So, I walk and raise money for the CROP walk to do my small part to help others have food to eat and safe water to drink. This year, BUMC will be the host church for the Barrington walk in October and I hope to see all of you there.

What does it mean to be the host church?

Several churches – St Paul UCC, St. Anne Catholic Community, Barrington UMC, Salem UMC, Lutheran Church of the Atonement, Presbyterian Church of Barrington, St. Michael's Episcopal Church, St. Mark's Episcopal Church, and Community Church of Barrington — have alternated hosting the Barrington Area CROP Walk each year. The host church is responsible for organizing spaces ahead of time, for providing hospitality and for cleaning up after the Walk. Since we are outside of the Village, St. Paul United Church of Christ opens up their building for our use, making us doubly accountable for being prepared to set up and clean up.

Some of the ways that you can help:

- Provide healthy snacks sufficient for BUMC's walkers.
- Arrive at St. Paul's by 11:00 a.m. to set up tables for each church's registration and snack and beverage service.
- Volunteer to serve as a greeter and direct folks to their registration table (or the rest rooms) from 12:00 pm until all the walkers have stepped off.
- Help with BUMC's registration table so that all our walkers are well cared for.
- Staff a "rest stop" along the route from 1:00-3:00 p.m.
- Set out the snacks (available to walkers upon their return), prepare lemonade, coffee, etc., serve, and then clean up snacks after the Walk, 12:15-3:30 p.m. (shifts available).
- Volunteer from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. to welcome the walkers back for refreshments and to cleanup and return all the spaces at St. Paul's to pristine condition.

All told, we would like to have 12 volunteers as a part of our host team. Of course, we would also like lots of walkers as the host church and so that the BUMC team can continue to contribute to the work of ending hunger locally and worldwide.

OUTSIDE THE WALLS PRISON MINISTRY

This is a community re-entry event, part of our prison ministries, in partnership with Reverend Tommie A. Johnson. Rev. Johnson worked as a Recovery Support Services Coordinator for TASC and the State of Illinois Prison System. He developed OUTSIDE THE WALLS to provide additional support to the men and women living in halfway houses in and around Chicago. In addition to a family picnic, this event brings together a variety of social services organizations and offers an uplifting worship service for those trying to re-integrate into their community. BUMC members who have attended previously have helped with the cooking and celebrated with the guests. Reverend Johnson could use our help, even if it is simply a ministry of presence and prayer. Volunteers are needed to help with setup and to serve food. There will be a choir singing as well as other entertainment and inspirational messages. The Wednesday Night Book Club just finished reading "The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness." A thoroughly researched, academic work, it was both challenging and enlightening to read. Here are some excerpts:

- ⁴⁴ More African American adults are under correctional control today – in prison or jail, on probation or parole – than were enslaved in 1850, a decade before the Civil War began.⁷ The mass incarceration of people of color is a big part of the reason that a black child born today is less likely to be raised by both parents than a black child born during slavery.⁸ ... Thousands of black men have disappeared into prisons and jails, locked away for drug crimes that are largely ignored when committed by whites.
- ⁴⁴ All of us violate the law at some point in our lives. In fact, if the worst thing you have ever done is speed ten miles over the speed limit on the freeway, you have put yourself and others at more risk of harm than someone smoking marijuana in the privacy of his or her living room. Yet there are people in the United States serving life sentences for first-time drug offenses, something virtually unheard of anywhere else in the world.

⁴⁴ One reason so many people have a false impression of the economic well-being of African Americans, as a group, is that poverty and unemployment statistics do not include people who are behind bars. Prisoners are literally erased from the nation's economic picture, leading standard estimates to underestimate the true jobless rate by as much as 24 percentage points for less-educated black men.¹¹ Young African American men were the only group to experience a steep increase in joblessness between 1980 and 2000, a development directly traceable to the increase in the penal population. During the much heralded economic boom of the 1990s, the true jobless rate among noncollege black men was a staggering 42 percent (65 percent among black male dropouts).¹²

Congratulations to two BUMC members who have been recognized as outstanding volunteers this year!



Since 2014, **George Peirce** has been the Barrington Area Council on Aging's go-to-volunteer for everything from transporting older adults to general home maintenance.

"George's kindness, patience and generosity are endless," says BACOA's Social Service Coordinator Sue McNamara. "We couldn't help some clients as much as we do without George's help."

The affable 73-year old has helped dozens of BACOA clients over the years, but what makes George particularly critical to BACOA and its clients is his sense of compassion and desire to help others.

"There was one client that needed help in an emergency situation over a weekend," said McNamara. "George took that client all the way down to the University of Illinois Chicago hospital and didn't get home until 3:00 a.m. That's dedication!"

Peirce's dedication also extends to Citizens for Conservation, where he helps on special projects including the Baker's Lake bird count.



Long-time Barrington resident **Wayne Schild** volunteered for years at Noah's Ark Christian Academy developing and executing an outdoor program, for children to learn about and appreciate nature.

But he wanted to do more, so he began volunteering for the Citizens for Conservation where he has served on its board of directors while performing a host of essential functions.

"For almost 10 years, Wayne has maintained the CFC database of donors and members, volunteering about 400 hours annually," said Edith Auchter, a 2016 Hall of Fame recipient also for CFC. "Wayne also submits electronic publicity to community publications for events and provides expert technical and design support to numerous CFC committees." But it's Wayne's enthusiasm for nature and the outdoors that makes him a valued CFC volunteer.

"Wayne has a passion for the outdoors and a love of wildlife in its natural habitat," said Auchter. "He makes a significant contribution."

Small Acts of Kindness

n Sunday, June 3, Volcán de Guego in southern Guatemala erupted. Our TeachGuatemala mission in Mixco is only about 30 miles from Escuentila, one of the affected towns. Pastor Chajon, whose church houses our

Saturday ESL program, wanted to help. He contacted Jay Kim, BUMC member for advice. Jay suggested small acts of love and kindness to the victims. His team provided \$380 to purchase toilet paper, bottled water and emergency products from the local Wal-Mart and to pay for gas for the trip. The entire neighborhood came together to provide assistance. They collected vegetables, homemade bread and prepared juices; then sorted them into hundreds of small plastic bags. Volunteers included church members, ESL students, other students and elderly neighbors with time to assist. The team went first to El Rodeo. They brought so much, that they had leftovers so they made a second stop in Alenantanango. Pastor Chajon and the neighborhood volunteers sent back a message with the pictures: "God bless you. Thank you for everything. God bless Barrington Church."







PADS of Elgin Addressing homelessness in our area

Engage Serving Others Near and Far

On Wednesday, July 18 ten people from First West Dundee and Barrington UMC toured the PADS of Elgin shelter with Penny Rick, their Volunteer Coordinator. Here are some of the things we learned during our visit:

- \cdot PADS is an emergency homeless shelter serving Hanover Township and Elgin the U46 school district.
- The shelter is open daily from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. with an evening meal, laundry, showers and breakfast available. A site manager is present.
- Clients, whose backgrounds are checked upon arrival, work with one of three case workers on a 90-day plan. Steps include finding a job, arranging transportation and saving enough to get into permanent housing. Job and housing opportunities are posted daily. It is a hand up, not a hand out!
- Forty-five percent of PADS clients are employed. Most are male, but women and children are in residence. This summer, this PADS shelter is housing about 35 people. In the winter, it often goes up to 70 people. They could house up to 96 guests if necessary.

Sexual Harassment & Assault FAITHLINK STUDY

Sunday, August 5 at 11:00 a.m. in Room 111, facilitated by Maelynn McCrory

The recent revelations about movie producer Harvey Weinstein have sparked a national conversation about sexual harassment and assault. Many women have spoken up publicly about their experiences. This resource by Rebekah Jordan Gienapp looks at how our faith guides us to listen and to respond and how the church can be a place of healing for individuals who have experienced sexual harassment and assault.

85th Annual Rummage Sale!

Barrington United Methodist Church will be holding its 85th sale on Friday, October 5 and Saturday, October 6, with donation drop off beginning on September 30.

The sale began during the Great Depression when "times were tough" and church families reached out to help each other. Church members brought in their unneeded items and out-grown clothing and traded the items between families. When there were many items left after a few of these events, the idea of having a rummage sale, so others experiencing hard times could share the abundance, evolved. Records of one of the first sales, in 1932, showed a profit of \$11.67.

Now, 85 years later, the sale continues to serve the same purpose—helping others who may be experiencing hard times. Money raised from the sale goes to many different mission projects—many of them local, including ChildServ, Meals with Wheels, FISH Food Pantry, Northern Illinois Food Bank and the mission work of United Methodist Women.

Not only are you helping others with your donations, you're helping to keep usable items out of landfills. If you have questions regarding your furniture items or if you are moving or can't store items until October, please contact Mary Mellon, (847) 217-2760. Again this year we will have a smaller tent for accent furniture pieces, large garden items, large plastic toys, bikes and sporting goods. We are no longer able to handle the logistics of taking large pieces of furniture, such as upholstered pieces, kitchen/dining sets, large entertainment units, large bookcases, china cabinets, dressers, etc. We will accept smaller decorative pieces like accent chairs and tables.
