Do a New Thing

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." —ISAIAH 43:19

hen the prophet Isaiah spoke those beautiful words on behalf of God, he was delivering a radical and much-anticipated message. The Israelites had been conquered by the Babylonian Empire and many of their leaders had been sent out of their homeland into exile. The loss of leaders and the loss of a home would be traumatic for any nation, but perhaps even more so for the people Israel. They had long understood themselves to be God's chosen people and now it appeared that God had withdrawn the blessing from them. Likewise, they understood the land that they occupied was a tangible sign of the Covenant between themselves and God, and now they had lost possession of it.

Frankly, times had never been so bad and the future had never seemed so bleak. One can only imagine the extent to which fear and anxiety about their future filled their lives and consumed their thoughts. What had gone wrong? What had they done to deserve this? Imagine how they felt as they watched the Babylonians destroy their beloved Temple-the place where they believed God lived. Their once proud past was a dim memory and their future was anything but assured.

Those ancestors of ours had a choice to make. Were they going to give in to defeat? Were they going to accept the narrative that God was no longer with them, caring for them and guiding them? Or were they going to trust that the God who had always been faithful to them was still to be trusted? I wonder how

they received that prophecy from Isaiah: "I am about to do a new thing, now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

I wasn't around on October 28, 1998 when the Barrington United Methodist Church building burned to the ground. But I have to imagine that some of the same emotions the Israelites felt were present that day and later that night when the congregation gathered to pray and seek God's comfort. I understand there were some prophets who, from the beginning, spoke a word of hope. Clearly there were some very faithful people who believed that God was most certainly with them and would never abandon them, and in fact would "do a new thing" out of the ashes of the old. I am grateful that they were willing to believe and follow God and to take a risk at doing a whole new thing when they rebuilt a little more than 4 miles south of the old location on a parcel with plenty of land and parking. I am grateful for the prophets among them who heard a new word from God and I am awestruck at the faith and trust they placed in God as that new thing sprung forth.

It occurs to me that we who now call Barrington United Methodist Church our church home are facing our test of faith. On a global level, the future of the United Methodist denomination is under attack and before the battle is settled some might find themselves exiled and we will likely be scattered. In our own church we are experiencing a level of anxiety and fear over the loss of some of our beloved and talented staff members and colleagues and we wonder how we will ever replace them and if we can possibly continue on without them.

Friends, I believe that the time has come for us to demonstrate our faith and trust in God. The truth is that we cannot control what happens with our denomination, but we can determine the vitality and viability of Barrington United Methodist and its Multi-Site Partner churches as we live into God's future. I don't think we can "replace" the people who have moved on to their new calling—they are irreplaceable. What we can and must do is pray, discern, and listen so that we can perceive it, and then we must risk ourselves as we join in this new thing that God is doing in this place.

How blessed we are to have the witness of forefathers and foremothers who have faced these challenges before us and who have showed us how to make this journey and walk this path in faith, trusting God as we go

Congregational Gardening Goes Viral: Idea Spreads Across Churches in West Africa

Jay Kim, a member of the BUMC Missions Committee, has a tremendous heart for international mission work. To be effective, he travels to conferences with Gospel Medical Mission International. Two years ago, Jay and Reverend Jerome, who works with local pastors in Kinshasa, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, connected Barrington UMC with a local Congolese church. Barrington UMC provided \$500 in seed money (for seeds) and Jay sent pictures of the life cycle of the BUMC Congregational Garden. Local Congolese church members donated their labor and Reverend Jerome sent us back pictures of the local garden. Pete Wesley, Chairperson of BUMC Missions, named the project GrowDRC in May 2017.

In the second year, GrowDRC spread to a second city, Pweto, where many refugees are located. A small church there grew and as others heard about the garden project, more money was donated.

A garden was started at the Abba International School in Banjul, The Gambia West Africa in 2018. And another church garden opened in Ghana. Jay worked with the local people, always providing seed money and pictures of the BUMC Congregational Garden. No longer confined to the DRC, it was renamed the Barrington Farm Project.

Presently, Reverend Jerome receives funding from the Grace Church Movement in Osaka, Japan and works with Dr. Randall Hoag of Voices of Community Fellowship (VOCF) in Seattle, Washington. VOCF "exists to help people, leaders and communities experience transformation." They focus on the root causes of poverty focusing on small projects that build confidence and are community-led.

At an International Missions meeting in Chiang Mai, Thailand this summer, Dr. Randall Hoag began sharing the idea of "Small Farms Everywhere." He and Jay were invited to speak at the 2nd Africa Regional Conference in Gambia this fall by Rev. Jerome and Abba International School. The Conference had a long agenda; but, despite Jay being unable to attend, the topic that generated the most interest was small farms similar to the BUMC Congregational Gardens. As Dr. Hoag spoke about the farming initiative, it became a key focus for those in attendance. Now 26 church pastors are sharing the news, their excitement about congregational gardens and the difference they can make in their communities and for their churches.

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Joyful Hands: Habitat for Humanity Northern Fox Valley

Toyful Hands (a partnership consisting **J** of BUMC and six Barrington area churches) is working with the Habitat for Humanity Northern Fox Valley affiliate on a house build in Carpentersville. The churches provide a good portion of the financial backing for this project and the Habitat affiliate provides a project lead and guidance throughout the construction, overseeing the work, helping with safety and assigning tasks. The Joyful Hands church volunteers began working on this project on September 22. Some of the work had already been done by the Habitat affiliate using regular volunteers, but that stopped once Joyful Hands became engaged in the build. In the near future, the Affiliate will have volunteers also working on the house on Wednesdays and Fridays, in addition to the Joyful Hands Saturday build. This will help us to get more people involved and finish the house quicker. The house will be a 4 bedroom/2

bath with a detached garage. The property was an abandoned house that was purchased and demolished by Habitat.

The homeowner's name is Angelica and she has four children (three boys and one girl). Her youngest daughter is 2 1/2 years old and her sons range in age from 8 to 16. Angelica works as many as four parttime jobs and is also volunteering with the ReStore and at the job site to put in the required 250 hours of sweat equity. About half of the 250 hours can be done by friends and family, but she does not have a great deal of that type of support.

Angelica has been working since she was 17 years old. She is looking forward to having a home where her children can live happily and be satisfied with their surroundings. She is excited about the building process and knows it won't be easy. She is committed to give everything she has to learn and get to know the people that dedicate their time to making her dream come true.

I volunteered for the nurturer role and will have direct contact with her to guide her through the process. I've also worked side by side with her on the job site cleaning up vegetation, moving rocks, building the front porch, taping around the window frames and general clean up.

The framing is nearly complete on the home and the walls are installed. Roofing should be done soon and then we should be able to install the doors and windows and begin installing the siding. The good news is that the house should be "buttoned up" by November 1st and completed sometime in the Spring. Still, lots needs to be done with inside and outside work along with landscaping.






